The Howard County Advertiser, September 9, 1863 (p. 2, col. 1), contains the following article:

"On Tuesday last [September 6], a detachment from this post, went in pursuit of one Captain (Clifton, sometimes rendered as or Clifford or Cliff) Holtsclaw [sic], who, it is said, has recently returned from Price's army, and who is at the head of a band of guerrillas now operating in this County. It was first reported that Captain Holtsclaw had taken prisoner, a man by the name of Bullock, belonging to Guitar's regiment, and that he, Holtsclaw, intended to kill him. This caused the detachment to be sent out, they went to the house of James Holtsclaw, the father of the reported Captain, and told him that he must pilot them over the country. They all got ready, and were in the act of starting, when one of the soldier's guns was accidentally discharged, the contents entering the head of the old man, killing him almost instantly. This was indeed a sad occurrence, and none seem to regret it more than Lt. Street, who was in c at the time the accident occurred.'

Born to James Holsclaw and Lucinda Feland Holsclaw in Richmond Twsp, Howard County Mo Clifton D. Holsclaw was a contemporary of many familiar names like Jackson and Jackman. Born on 13 Oct 1825, he was the oldest of eleven children. Milton T. Along with brothers Clifton D. And James P. Travel to California in 1849 in search of gold. Having some success Milton becomes a fixture in Santa Clara County while his brothers return to Missouri prior to the 1860 Census. The Holsclaws were an affluent agricultural family owning 11 slaves and nearly \$17,000 of land and property in the 1860 census. It comes as no surprise then that the male members of the family, being of prime military age, decided to enter into the service of the Missouri State Guard. Five of the Holsclaw boys joined the 6th Missouri Infantry Volunteers, Co G at Cove Creek Arkansas, a devastating decision for the family as it turns out. None escaped unscathed, Clifton being wounded at Elk Horn Tavern, James P. at Vicksburg requiring a long hospitalization, and the other 3 boys making the ultimate sacrifice, William at Corinth, John and Benjamin at Vicksburg. The 6th MO Inf (CSA) was assigned to the First Missouri Brigade under Cockrell at Vicksburg and fought against neighbors and friends on that field of battle but that is yet another story. Suffice it to say, that Mrs. Lucinda Holsclaw had a very bad year from mid summer 1862 on when her eldest son appears back home wounded with a recruiting commission, losing a son in October of that year and then losing 2 more sons with the fifth severely wounded. Put into the mix watching her husband get shot in the head in her own front yard in September of 1863, plus at least one report that her eldest daughter Mary Elizabeth had been killed at home trying to dry gunpowder in the summer of '62, it takes a strong woman to keep the emotions together and the farm running. Clifton establishes a guerrilla unit that plagues the Union officials and militia throughout the years of 1863 and 1864.

He appears to give himself over to authorities in June 1865, taking the oath of allegiance and returning to the Howard County farm he grew up on. 1870 finds him the head of the household, farming, caring for his now 70 year old mother who was to die within a couple of years. Under his care were his younger brother James P. now working as a school teacher and three sisters Eliza J, Frances A., and Sarah M. all old enough to be called spinsters in that day. Eventually, Eliza and Sarah marry in he late 1870's. No off spring is known of from these unions. Clifton and James P. appear to liquidate their limited post war assets and move westward, perhaps to remove themselves from the community which they could easily have felt disassociated from. In 1880 James P. is found living on a farm in Bates Co. Missouri with his older sister Eliza J. (Holsclaw) White, Eliza having married the year before in

Howard Co. Missouri to one William C. White. Clifton is just across the border in Linn Co. Kansas working as a carpenter. Sometime in the intervening 20 years, Clifton manages to attend a number of confederate soldier reunions listing his address in 1890 as being in Hume, Missouri which is located in Bates County where his sister and brother have been residing. In the 1900 Census, Clifton is again listed as living with his sister Eliza White in Hume, Bates Co., Missouri where he spends the sunset of his life passing away in July of 1908 apparently having never married nor leaving any off spring. Eliza dies 17 Sept 1913 of uterine cancer, her younger brother James P. being the death certificate informant. James P. dies at age 85 on the farmstead having never married as well, per Ray McConnell the local funeral director who buried all 3 of the Holsclaws in the Hume Cemetery.

Thus a poignant and somewhat sad story of a family, the descendants of an early Missouri pioneer from Kentucky who carved what by any standards of the day would appear to be the pinnacle of agrarian success only to lose it all in the turbulent times of Civil War Missouri.

This worthy pioneer was born in Howard county, Missouri, July 12, 1827, where he received a limited education, and learned the blacksmith's trade with his father, who carried on that business in connection with farming. He is the eldest of fourteen children, ten of whom lived to man's estate. Mr. Holsclaw joined the Christian Church, August 23, 1849. In company with his brothers, Clifton D., and James P., Holsclaw, the subject of our narrative, left his native state to cross the plains for California, arriving at Diamond Springs the 9th September of that year[ one year to the day before California was admitted as a state]. Here they erected the second house in that place, established a provision depot and made it their headquarters, also engaging in mining in the Martinez and Weber creeks, finally moving, in January 1851, to the middle fork of the Cosumne river, where they were successful, until April 1st, making from forty to fifty dollars a day per man. At this time Mr. Holsclaw's two brothers joined the forces sent to meet the Indians, while our subject proceeded to Sacramento City, where, purchasing a wagon and team, he commenced freighting to Grass Valley, Yuba and Placerville. In the month of June he laid in a stock of provisions, and, proceeding to Shasta City, sold them, but so bold were the natives that he had to stand guard over his mules in the very heart of town. He then returned to Sacramento, after a very rapid march from fear of Indians, and there, on July 3d, once more joined his brothers. The National Holiday they passed in that city, and on the day after started southwards, visiting Stockton, Livermore Pass, Mission San Jose, San Jose City, and finally arrived at Gilroy, August 2, 1851, determining to make their home; his brother, J. P. Holsclaw, and himself being the two first members of a Protestant Church to locate

there. Here they kept open house to members of all Christian denominations, the first arrangement of the South Methodist Church in the district being organized there in 1853. In September 1851, he started the first blacksmith shop in Gilroy. In 1852, the Holsclaw brothers raised the first crop of wheat in the Gilroy District, which they conveyed to Alviso and sold at eight cents per pound. In the following year they added barley to their production and manufactured some flour, which they disposed of in a radius of thirty miles on credit, to all that wanted bread. The honesty of the settlers is fully borne out by Mr. Holsclaw's statement that out of six thousand dollars' worth of produce thus sold, he lost only sixteen dollars. In 1854 he moved on to the farm now occupied by Hon. T. R. Thomas. In 1854-5 he was Constable of Gilroy township. In 1856 he sold his farm, and moved to the tract now occupied by Mr. Graff and Frank Smith. This he disposed of, in 1858, and moved to the lot on which the railroad depot now stands. In 1859 he disposed of this property, and built the house now occupied by D. Hildebrand, and there resided until he purchased, in 1860, a farm near that of D. Zuck, where he dwelt until 1867. In 1868, selling his land, he embarked in the sheep business, and moved his family to the town of Gilroy. In 1872, disposing of this last enterprise, he purchased the property known as the Homestead tract, where he now resides. In 1875 he sold his town property, and took up his residence on the farm. Mr. Holsclaw married, February 11, 1855, Mary Ann Zuck, a native of Marion county, Ohio, by whom he has had ten children. Of these, the following are now living: William B., born March 6, 1860; Florence Mabel, born November 28, 1871; Gracie Ellen, born March 16, 1874

MILTON T. HOLSCLOW  
First Blacksmith Shop in Gilroy, 1851  
Gilroy Township

Milton T. Holsclaw was born in Howard County, Missouri, July 12, 1827. He crossed the plains, and after working awhile in the mines, he came to Gilroy, in August, 1851, and a month later started the first blacksmith shop in Gilroy. In 1852 he and his brother raised the first crop of wheat in the Gilroy District, of which they sold a portion in Alviso at eight cents per pound. He now has a ranch of 140 acres along the Los Llagas Creek, two miles (in an air line) northeast of Gilroy. Of this land he has thirty acres in alfalfa, which was sowed in 1876, and has borne continuously since that time without replanting. This has been cut two or three seasons for hay, but it has been pastured the most of the time.

On this he has the present year (1888) kept forty head of cattle, twelve horses, and fifty hogs, and has never fed them anything else. The hogs he sold for market. He keeps ten milch cows now, but usually milks from ten to twenty-five. The product of the dairy is principally butter, for which he finds a ready market with regular customers in this vicinity. He makes butter the year round,--from fifty to one hundred pounds per week. He raises from fifty to seventy-five acres of barley every year, obtaining from thirty to forty bushels to the acre. Mr. Holsclaw rented 230 acres of land in 1888, of which 115 are in wheat and 115 in barley, which will be cut for grain. He never irrigates. In 1875 he set out about 100 trees, consisting of apples, pears, peaches, prunes, cherries, etc., and has been adding to it since, until he now has about twenty-five acres in fruit, of which eighteen acres were set out this year in prunes and peaches. The trees have borne well, the only drawback being the codlin moth in the apples and pears.

He came to Gilroy in 1851, and has resided within a stone's throw of the town ever since. His present residence he erected in 1875. The first place he settled on is now within the city limits of Gilroy, owned by Thomas Rea. He and his brother were the only ones who had grain to sell in Gilroy in 1852-53, and they sold to immigrants and others in the vicinity of Gilroy, mostly on credit, and out of \$6,000 worth so sold, they only lost \$16.

He was married February 11, 1855, to Mary Ann Zuck, a native of Marion County, Ohio, by whom he has three children now living.
