Carroll County Court Oct-22^d. 1827.

On this 22^d day of October 1827 personally appeared in open court, being a Court of record for said county, Thomas Chandler, resident in said county, aged sixty five years; who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the provisions made by the act of Congress of the 18th of March 1818 & the 1st of May 1820, that he the said Thomas Chandler enlisted for the term of three years or during the war in the 1st day of March preceding States defeat in the state of North Carolina in the company commanded by Captain William Little in the regiment commanded by Colonel Harton in the line of militia of North-Carolina, in the North-Carolina continental establishment; that he continued to serve in the said corps until after the surrender of Lord Cornwallis when he was discharged from the service near Bandon in South Carolina, after serving four years, that he hereby relinquishes any claim whatever to a pension, except the present that his name is not on the rolls of any State as a pensioner; & that the reason for not making earlier application for a pension, are, that hitherto he has been able to support himself and family by his labour, and from the loss of his discharge, he did not know nor was he advised that he could receive any aid from the Government. Nor did he know how to proceed.

And in pursuance of the act of the first of May 1820
do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of
the United States on the 18th of March 1818, and that I
have not since that time, by gift sale or in any manner

disposed of my property or any part thereof without intent
therby to to diminish it; as to bring my self within
the provisions of an act of Congress intituled an act to
provide for certain persons engaged in the land and
naval service of the United States in the revolutionary
war passed the 18th day of March 1818; and that I have
not nor have any person in trust for me, any property
or securities, contracts or debts due to me nor have I any
income other than what is contained in the Schedule in
annexed and by me subscribed.

A Schedule of the property both personal & real held
by Thomas Chandler an applicant for a pension
Beefary bedding and Clothing excepted: to wit

Two cows, two mare & head of Hogs.

And the said Thomas Chandler further states on
oath, that he is by occupation a laborer and
from his age and the infirmities attending he is
not able to do as much labor in the common
employment of Farmers, as will enable him to
command wages, that his family consists of a wife
aged about sixty four years also very frail.

I That since the 18th of March 1818 the said Thomas
Chandler says upon oath, that there has been no change
in point of value of his property, that as the cattle
and hogs grew up and were used by his family,
that he raised others, that he has not sold or exchanged
gum, or suffered to be sold by any officers fines that
time any property whatever.

I John Samuels clerk of the County Court of Cabell
County in the State of Virginia do hereby certify that it
appears to the satisfaction of the Court that the said
Thomas Chandler did serve in the Revolutionary War
as stated in the preceding declaration against the
Common enemy for the term of nine months under
the engagement on the continental establishment
I also certify that the foregoing oath and the Schedule
thereto annexed are truly copied from the records of
said Court; And I do further certify that it is
the opinion of the said Court that the total amount
in value of the property exhibited in the aforesaid
Schedule is thirty five dollars.

this 8th day of January 1828.

Thomas Frazier a private in Capt. Lytle's
Company of the 10th Regiment enlisted on
the day of ^{inst'd July 1782.}

Sir

The musterrolls does not show any thing
more respecting the enlistment and service
of Thomas Frazier than is stated in the above
certificate. The quotation "inst'd July 1782,"
is placed on the rolls under the head, occur-
rences. When he enlisted I cannot say, if not
before 1782 he could not have served four
years as the war ended in 1783. I think it
probable he served more than twelve months
