Walter Cunningham - alias of Dr -

July 12. 1834. Mr Cunningham made
the following statement of his cap and services as
a soldier in the war of the Revolution - born and died in
the County of Shenandoah until the year 1776. - in the
fall of that year he came across the Allegany
Mountains to his brother on Blingamore creek near
Harrison city. - Capt. Daniel Scott was then enlisting
men for Virginia - he enlisted under Scott in the
Militia - and sailed on the west fork of Blingamore
fishing creek and through the lower part of Harrison
county at present lands. - he was sent across the
Allegheny and sent up unto his former company which
was on the 7th day of February 1777. Known nothing about
the authority under which Scott acted. Nor does he
know whether he was commissioned as Captain by the State
authority or for his discharge of Captain he had no
~~to~~ ^{to} have been a Captain in the service of the State or
any other authority. - he volunteered under Capt. W. McElroy
to go against the Shawnee town on the Ohio River,
marched to the mouth and joined there a few more
companies - (Harrison Buck. John Alexander, & the
McElroys were captains of the other companies) Marched
from the mouth to Fort Pitt. then joined Gen. Hand's
army. Went thence to Fort Washington. remained there
several weeks. - the company returned to Pitt. after he
got back his 3 months pay got his discharge from
Capt. McElroy and went home. - he gave the discharge
to Gen. Washington. Subsequently soon took with him the
spirit bottle - given him last winter by Adam Cunningham

Note - the service details in the first letter. must have
been irregular and unimportant - it was a neighborhood
matter - as to the Shawnee town, or it is probable that men

On the 21st day of August in the year 1832

Peterally appeared in open court before the justices
of said county of Harrison in court now sitting
Walter Birmingham a resident of Simpson's Creek Harrison
county aged 83 years who being first duly sworn according
to law doth on his oath make the following declaration
in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress
passed June 4th 1802

That in the year 1776 he resided in
the county of Shenandoah State of Virgⁿ That in the
summer of the aforesaid year he visited the county of
Monongahela in said state. That when there he enlisted
in a company of Rangers under the command of Capt.
David Scott. That he was employed in reconnoitring
the country between the Monongahela and Ohio River
that while thus engaged the company was frequently
successful in discovering the approach of Indians and in
conveying intelligence to the forts and settlements so as
to apprise and guard them against danger.

That he was discharged at the termination of three
months the discharge is here with enclosed

In the fall of 1777 after having returned home to
Shenandoah he enlisted under Capt Michael Radon
marched to fort Pitt was attached to a regiment commanded
by General Hand from thence he descended the Ohio
river to Wheeling where he was discharged after having
served three months he was never widely engaged in
any battle during his continuance in said service

that he has no documentary evidence except the accompanying discharge signed by Lieutenant John Mahon. That he knows of no living witness except his brother Adlai Cunningham whose affidavit is here with subscribed
That he removed from Shenandoah to Harrison where he now resides many years ago
That he is acquainted with John Wilder David Davison William A. Harrison John J. Allen and various other persons in the neighbourhood where he resides to whom offence may be had
That he hereby relinquishes all claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state

Dear Madam:

You are furnished herein the record of Walter Cunningham as found in pension claim, S. 9268, based upon his service in the Revolutionary War.

Walter Cunningham was born in December, 1749, in Shenandoah County, Virginia. The names of his parents are not shown.

While residing in Shenandoah County, Virginia, in the summer of 1776, he went to visit in Monongalia County, his brother, and while there enlisted and served three months as a private in Captain David Scott's company of Virginia rangers engaged in scouting and guarding the country against the Indians and was discharged February 1, 1777, then returned to his home in Shenandoah County, Virginia. He volunteered in the fall of 1777 to go against the Shawnee towns on the Ohio River, and served three months as private in Captain Michael Eader's Virginia company, marched to Fort Pitt where he was attached to a regiment commanded by General Hand, descended the Ohio River to Wheeling where he was discharged.

After the war, the soldier moved from Shenandoah County to Harrison County, Virginia, where he was residing when he was allowed pension on his application executed August 21, 1832, his exact place of residence being Simpson Creek, in that county.

No reference was made in the claim to wife or children of Walter Cunningham.

In 1832, the soldier referred to his brother, Adam Cunningham, but did not give his place of residence or any other details concerning him. It is not shown whether Adam Cunningham was the brother Walter Cunningham visited in 1776 in Monongalia County, Virginia.

In order to obtain date of last payment of pension, the name and address of the person paid and possibly the date of death of Walter Cunningham, the soldier, you should write to the Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Records Division, this city, and cite the following data:
